OPEN UP THE SHERMAN-

BREARLY FREE-FLOW LANE?

If you're used to walking about our neighborhood, you'd better start talking about our neighborhood—more specifically, the Sherman/Gorham/Brearly intersection.

The City of Madison traffic Engineering Department has heard nothing but complaints from motorists who must stop at the intersection as they travel toward downtown from the far Northeast side. City officials have heard little about the positive effects of closing off the Sherman Avenue free flow lane at Brearly; the

lowered volume of traffic on Sherman Avenue; how much safer it is for pedestrians, many of whom are children, to cross Sherman Avenue now that traffic is required to stop there.

Ald. Loren Thoresen (12th Ald. Dist) is recommending that the free-flow lane be restored before the end of the complete testing period asked for by the Tenney-Lapham Neighborhood Association.

The Neighborhood Council feels that the opening of the free-flow lane would invalidate the test by causing a significant amount of traffic to move down Sherman Avenue and through the neighborhood, rather than other routes better able to handle heavy traffic.

The Common Council will decide the fate of the present free-flow lane cutoff at its Tuesday, February 8th meeting. Write to City Transportation Director Warren Somerfeld. Come to the Council meeting Tuesday night and register against the Thoresen proposal.

If you value the benefits derived from these traffic changes, and particularly those which have come about through the closing of the Sherman Avenue free-flow lane, then the time for action is now.



PEDESTRIAN RIGHTS CAMPAIGN

Police Chief David Couper is considering a nine-week pedestrian rights education/enforcement campaign. The plan, recommended by members of neighborhood organizations and People United for Responsible Energy, calls for a three-part implementation schedule:

weeks combined police-citizen education 1-3 effort on pedestrian safety laws

weeks continued public education, along 4-6 with intensive enforcement of pedestrian laws by Madison Policeespecially during rush hours

weeks "spot" enforcement at particularly 7-9 hazardous intersections

The recommendation urges that the campaign begin on April 11th. It calls for a permanent reallocation of police resources to prioritize pedestrian safety and asks for cooperation between the Madison Police and Traffic Departments, so as to achieve a climate of pedestrian, bicycle and motor vehicle safety throughout the city.

ALTERNATE PARADE OF HOMES


IS COMING OUR WAY


