


Federal funds are presently available to assist in the establishment of a school breakfast program here in Madison. Wisconsin statistics show that as many as 30% of all children begin the day with an inadequate meal, if they eat at all. A breakfast program would be run in the same way that the successful lunch program has been run; some families would be eligible for free meals and some would qualify for meals at a reduced rate. The Madison School Breakfast Committee is now involved in organizing a pilot breakfast program and Marquette Elementary and Middle Schools would be a part of the pilot operation. The proposition to establish school breakfasts is now in committee with the School Board, but to ensure passage of this concept, your opinions are needed. NEIGHBORHOOD SIGNS GO UP!

The Tenney-Lapham neighborhood sign project came to fruition last week as multi-colored Tenney-Lapham plaques sprouted on top of street corner signs throughout the neighborhood. Despite the long time coming (the project began when Paul Soglin was mayor, Don Murdoch our alderman, and Carol Huber our TLNA president), "they were worth waiting for" as one neighbor put it.

The idea behind the signs is to provide a tangible visual linkage within the neighborhood, to enhance our awareness of each other as neighbors, and to help express the feeling of many area people-that the Tenney Lapham Neighborhood is one fine place to live.

The sign project, coordinated by Paul Fieber, was mostly a self-help project with many volunteers and contributors. Financial support came from TLNA and neighborhood residents and businesses. Trachte Metal Buildings fabricated and donated the metal signs and Larry Shapiro of Quality Auto Painting donated labor and paint in applying the "school bus" yellow base coat. Also, Carol Huber's brother (John) of St. Louis cut the silk screens for the logo designed by Bob Naatz. The Fieber front porch became the silkscreen shop with Stan Wrzeski, Mary Kay Garrow, the Fieber kids, and others lending their steady hands. David Strandberg was on call with expert advice and help throughout the project. Special thanks goes to the City of Madison .Traffic Division for installing the signs.

CONFERENCE OF MADISON NEIGHBORHOODS IN OCTOBER

The City-Wide Organization of Neighborhoods and the Department of Planning and Development will sponsor the third annual Conference of Madison Neighborhoods on Saturday, October 18, 1980 in the Lapham School. The Conference will be a day long series of workshops, discussions and information exchange on issues that are of interest to neighborhood and resident organizations.




TENNEY-LAPHAM CORPORATION RECEIVES CONTRIBUTION
